Surprises

Lent is over and Easter has exploded on our hearts once again. Only in a climate like ours is there often a clear parallel between the advent of spring and the surprise of Easter. Both never get old, and we are always entirely ready.

The next divine "surprise" for us is Pentecost Sunday, commemorating the day God "gave birth" to the Church, 50 days after Easter. This year it falls in the middle of May.

Attention Parents Alison Achramowicz

Starting April 20 through May 25 (no class on April 27) during Wednesday night programs from 6:30-7:30, a new adult class, focusing on the topic of parenting, will begin and led by one of our church's Christian Education directors, Alison Achramowicz. This is an interactive class that includes videos discussions, and workbook activities (yes, you will have homework!). We will be using the parenting workbook by Doug & Cathy Fields, *Intentional Parenting: 10 Ways to be an Exceptional Parent in a Quick Fix World.* Here is the back cover summary:

Although, at some point, we move from DREAMS to DUCT TAPE and hope that each day everything will just stick together. Raising kids in today's culture is a difficult challenge and it requires a plan. Without a plan, parents usually default to Quick-fix Parenting. Let's face it: it's just easier to focus on immediate problems rather than deal with the deeper and more important ones. Surviving each day is much easier than taking the time and energy to consider how parenting actions impact a child's future. We get it.

To be an exceptional parent, you need to be an intentional parent. But, don't worry! You're not alone – Doug and Cathy are here to help. They're veteran parents who can help you move from Quick-Fix Parenting to Intentional Parenting.

It's never too late to become an intentional parent. Remember, you are the GREATEST influence in the life of your child (no matter their age)! And it can all begin with these resources. Let's walk this important journey – together."

Music Ministry from Paul Flyger

We just passed the second important milestone in the church year – Easter. What a great Holy Week we had this year! I had a wonderful time planning, preparing and performing all services with Dr. Bob and I hope they were meaningful and relevant for your Easter experience this season. Moments ago, I decided what the Easter Postlude will be next year. I plan to learn a new piece that's on my "bucket list" of organ repertoire over the summer so it will be ready for next Easter. I hope you'll love it as much as I do.

I was reminded of this piece last weekend when I attended the Inaugural Recital of the new Andrew Pipe Organ installed at Fourth Presbyterian Church in downtown Chicago. This is now the largest organ in Chicago with 204 stops, 5 keyboards and 8.343 pipes - a 3 million dollar project. This organ is basically double the size of our instrument and was built by the Quimby Pipe Organ Company in Warrensburg, Missouri. Their organist, John Sherer played this piece as the finale of that recital. I first heard this piece at the Young Artist's Competition at the American Guild of Organists Convention held in Lexington and I recall being on the edge of my seat with excitement as I watched Kate Emerson execute a magnificent performance that brought the entire audience to their feet at the conclusion. I vowed to learn it so I must discipline myself to the task.

During April our music ensembles will work on final preparations for Joyful Sunday, April 24 here at First Congregational. This year, we will engage most of our music ensembles for a joyful worship service of music. Yes, Dr. Bob will still have a homily, but you will experience a preview performance of what I am developing for our Musical Outreach Program that we're taking "on the road" to Pine Ridge on Sunday afternoon, May 15. This project will engage all ages of musicians and volunteers in an afternoon of fellowship, sharing, and music. The Called to Care Team and our Nurse Jan are teaming up to transport our members who aren't able to attend church regularly. If you'd like to assist with the project, please talk to me, Beth Kenagy or Nurse Jan. I'm sure we can find something for you to do!

On Friday April 15, the Alleluia Ringers are traveling to Dayton, OH for the Area 5 Handbell Musicians of American Conference 2016 with clinician Kevin McChesney. We are in the middle of three extra Monday evening 2-hour rehearsals so we will be ready. Five members of the Kalamazoo Ringers are joining 8 of our Alleluia Ringers to make a complete choir of 13 ringers who are looking forward to a great education and musical experience. We return Saturday evening after the final concert ends at 6 p.m. Please pray for a safe trip!

April 27-30 finds me, three other Christian Education staff members and Dr. Bob attending the Orange Conference in Atlanta, GA again. This was a fantastic experience last year and we are looking forward to more inspiration, ideas and education as we seek new and relevant ways to keep our kids engaged in meaningful worship experiences – not just until confirmation, but into college and through their whole life.

Health News from Parish Nurse Jan

April showers bring May flowers, or so "they" say. April will be a milestone month for me as I celebrate four years as your Parish Nurse.... and what an amazing adventure it has been thus far!

The last several months have brought abundant changes! Many of our church friends and acquaintances have had significant life altering events. Some of them have moved to other cities. Some have relocated to various care facilities. Some are dealing with life altering health changes, and others have left this world and are now at their heavenly home.

It has been a challenge for me because when there is change with those we hold in fellowship, there are health-related questions and concerns directed my way and to other church staff. Perhaps this is a good time to revisit the role and availability of the Parish Nurse,

Did you know that, although I am an employee of the church, I am also an employee of Lakeland Health? They started the Parish Nurse program here and we partner with them. As a Lakeland employee, I am legally bound by HIPAA, the privacy standards that protect individuals' medical records and other personal health information. Therefore, I must request that you not ask me about the health status of our congregants. Legally I can't give you an answer. I and selected church staff must be compliant. Therefore it is necessary to ask that you refrain from seeking information regarding the health status of our congregants. Failure for me to comply with HIPPA can result in serious legal consequences, and not just for health personnel. Seeking information does not stop with verbal communication but includes texting, emails, Facebook messaging and other forms of media. It is best to direct your concerns and questions to the individual, family member, agent, or power of attorney.

Generally, I am aware of most hospital admissions, transfers to other care facilities and declining health of our membership. I'm very fortunate to have a private line with messaging at my church office. If there is need to contact me, please call the church and follow the prompts to my voice mail. The line is secure and no other individuals have access. This is the appropriate choice of connecting to me and meets the current HIPAA guidelines.

As your Parish Nurse, I am available on Tuesdays, Wednesday & Thursdays from 8:30 a.m. to 4 p.m. There may be some slight variations to that schedule so contact the church office for my availability. If you have an emergency, or a serious health concern, please call your health provider or access emergency services by calling 911. My role as your Parish Nurse (generally) is as follows:

Health Educator - focusing on a variety of educational activities for all ages that explore the relationship between values, attitudes, lifestyle, faith and health.

Personal Health Counselor - assisting individuals to deal with health issues and problems and may include hospital, home, nursing home, etc. visits.

Referral Agent - providing congregational and community resources for healing and wellness.

Health Advocate - encouraging all systems (congregant, faith community, primary health resources) to find the best solution for healing and wholeness - body, mind and spirit.

Integrator of Faith and Health - seeking, in all activities and contacts, to promote the understanding of the relationship between faith and health.

Any Thing Else Dr. Bob Wants Me to Do!

Finally, I care about you and want to be available when the need arises, but I'm not "On Call" and I don't provide emergency interventions. I enjoy my days off, especially Sundays and holidays. If I'm not at First Congregational worshiping with you than my husband and I are attending services at St. Paul's in Stevensville. Please respect our time to worship and give thanks.

May Easter happiness continue to dwell in you and may you be blessed with peace, joy and goodness.
