Greetings from Dr. Bob

Lent Is Coming, and So Is Jesus There are three GREAT seasons of the Christian year. ADVENT leads us to the birth of Jesus Christ. LENT leads us to the crucifixion and resurrection of Jesus Christ. PENTECOST is the Spirit-filled birth of the Christian Church. These are the three pivotal acts of God for Christians.

We are entering LENT. In early Christianity, Christians took commitment to Jesus so seriously that new "converts" went through a period of preparation/instruction during the six weeks of Lent and were baptized on Easter Sunday. Now that's a sunrise service!

For centuries it was also common to do without or "give up" something during Lent, and to use the time and energy saved for something that would draw you closer to God. That is still a powerful practice.

It's also common for a church to focus on a particular theme, something that can draw us closer not only to God but also to one another. There are two ways we will do that this year. **FIRST**, you are invited to immerse yourself in our worship theme of getting to know Jesus better by what he meant for himself, and for us, when he said, "I am the light of the world," and then called you and me the light of the world. When he said, "I am the vine," and named us as his branches. When he said "I am the bread of life," and then commissioned us to feed the hungry. Everything Jesus said he then handed off to us, making us partners in his purposes.

We will read "The God We Can Know: Discovering the 'I Am' Sayings of Jesus," by Rob Fuquay. It's \$10. You can order it through the Church Office until February 4th, just a few days from now, so call the Church or put a note with your name on it in the offering plate. You can pay when they arrive. It's also available on Kindle.

We will also use this book and a series of video clips to go deeper into these sayings on Wednesday nights following supper, beginning February 17. This will be a rich time together. No reservations needed. Just come to the Gathering Room at 6:30.

His comparisons of the two will help answer our questions and look at the Muslim community through informed, educated eyes rather than with reactionary, stereotyping eyes. We'll meet from 9:15 to 10:10 am, Sundays beginning February 14th.

Ash Wednesday Service – February 10

Lent begins on Ash Wednesday, February 10, with our Ash Wednesday service of ashes and Communion at 6:30 p.m., for about 30 minutes, following a simple supper. Toward the end of the service, we come forward for Communion and for the sign of ashes, in the form of a cross, made on the forehead or the back of the hand.

Lent continues through six weeks, culminating in Holy Week: Palm Sunday, Maundy Thursday, Good Friday, and Easter Sunday. This year Easter falls on March 27.

Women's Book Group – Tuesday, February 23 at 9:30 a.m.

Walking in the Dust of Rabbi Jesus by Lois Tverberg brings the Bible to life as she explores the cultural context of Jesus' teachings. With well-researched information and a highly readable style, Tverberg explains:

- How understanding Jewish idioms and expressions can help us better grasp what Jesus was saying.
- How viewing Jesus within the context of Middle Eastern culture can enliven his parables in surprising new ways.
- How the Jewish world of Jesus can teach us many wise insights, like how to pray with *chutzpah* or think with both hands.

By understanding the religious and cultural atmosphere in which Jesus lived and taught, you will begin to understand why his first disciples abandoned everything to follow him. You'll also learn the meaning behind key Hebrew words that make Bible reading a richer, more powerful experience. And you'll see how Jewish customs, culture, and beliefs can enrich your life as a Christian whose faith first emerged from Jewish roots.

Prevention of Frostbite

I was hoping that winter would pass us by this year but it looks like we might have some frigid temperatures ahead. Here are a couple of tips to remember before you venture out into the cold weather.

Limit time you're outdoors in cold, wet or windy weather. Pay attention to weather forecasts and wind chill readings. In very cold windy weather, exposed skin can develop frostbite in a matter of minutes.

Dress in several layers of loose, warm clothing.

Air trapped between the layers of clothing acts as insulation against the cold. Wear windproof and waterproof outer garments to protect against wind, snow and rain. Choose undergarments that wick moisture away from your skin. Change out of wet clothing — particularly gloves, hats and socks as soon as possible. Wear a hat or headband that fully covers your ears. Heavy woolen or windproof materials make the best headwear for cold protection.

Wear mittens rather than gloves. Mittens provide better protection. Or try a thin pair of glove liners made of a wicking material (like polypropylene) under a pair of heavier gloves or mittens.

Wear socks and sock liners that fit well, wick moisture and provide insulation. You might also try hand and foot warmers. Be sure the foot warmers don't make your boots too tight, restricting blood flow.

Watch for signs of frostbite. Early signs of frostbite include red or pale skin, prickling, and numbness.

Plan to protect yourself. When traveling in cold weather, carry emergency supplies and warm clothing in case you become stranded. If you'll be in remote territory, tell others your route and expected return date.

Don't drink alcohol if you plan to be outdoors in cold weather. Alcoholic beverages cause your body to lose heat faster.

Eat well-balanced meals and stay hydrated.

Doing this even before you go out in the cold will help you stay warm. And if you do become cold, drinking warm, sweet beverages, such as hot chocolate, will help you warm up.

Keep moving. Exercise can get the blood flowing and help you stay warm, but don't do it to the point of exhaustion.
