Surprises, Part Two

Last month I wrote about surprises. I didn't tell you that retiring at the end of this year would be one of them. Surprise again.

Betty and I have talked this through for several months now, figuring out what would work best. December 31 is what we have decided. It will be just 1 month short of being here 15 years. 15 years! Holy smokes! Where did THAT go?!

recently. It so happens that this summer I will be only about 30 minutes from her, so she can help me to help you.

You. I don't like talking about this church as <u>your</u> church, and about what <u>you</u> will do. For over 14 years it has been <u>our</u> church and what <u>we</u> can do. That's how we're going to keep it, except when absolutely necessary.

Not one of us is immune to transitions. We can fight them, resist them and deny them, but we can't stop them. We can also anticipate them, plan for them, and even enjoy them together. That's my prayer for this one. I hope it's your prayer, too. Those prayers rise up to God, who oversees every transition imaginable while staying constant and dependable. You know the hymn:

Thy compassions they fail not.
As Thou hast been
Thou forever wilt be.

Pray for Our People In Russia



This was a very inspiring experience for those who went. The Purdue Bells gave a masterful opening concert! All 700 participants were on their feet several times. The Alleluia Ringers were energized, had a great time socializing, and gave a wonderful performance at the final concert. In this picture, we were in the last back row of the auditorium.

Myself, three other Christian Education staff members and Dr. Bob are attending the Orange Conference in Atlanta, GA. The Christian Education staff are looking forward to the inspiration and new ideas that will be presented as we seek new and relevant ways to keep our kids engaged in meaningful worship experiences – not just until confirmation, but into college and through their whole life.

The music ensembles are now focused on polishing the pieces we will present in a Music Program at Pine Ridge on Sunday, May 15 at 3:30 p.m. The Called to Care Team, along with Nurse Jan are busy coordinating transportation for church members who can't attend worship services regularly. Our middle school and high school youth are invited to help the Called to Care Team at Pine Ridge as we assemble and share refreshments from 3:00 – 3:30 p.m. before the program begins. After the program, we will pack up and help prepare their Activity Room for their evening meal. Four of our five music ensembles will be participating as they did for this past Joyful Sunday.

The Handbell Choirs are planning a fun summer evening on Saturday night, June 11!! We would like to expand our handchimes from four to five octaves to equal the five octaves of handbells we own. This is phase 1 of a dream to have all our chimes and handbells match. Our fifth octave of handbells is made by Malmark and the middle 4 octaves are made by Schulmerich. These are the two main companies that manufacture handbells in the US, but they unfortunately do not sound great together. We would like to own 5 octaves of matching Malmark handbells, and since they are much more expensive than handchimes, we will replace and expand the handchimes first.

Nurse Ian has generously offered to help re-create a 50's Sock Hop right here in our Fellowship Hall as a fundraiser for new handchimes. The Handbell Choirs will be working the event as well as transforming Fellowship Hall into a dance hall from the 50's. We hope the weather cooperates for additional socializing space on the outdoor patio as we share some heavy appetizers and beverages and mingle between the dance floor and the outdoors. This event will not be limited to church members and will include tickets. There will be a limit of 200 sold so mark your calendar now for Saturday, June 11 from 7-9 p.m. Begin practicing your dance steps now!

With a team composed of the sons of loggers, shipyard workers, and farmers, the University of Washington's eight-oar crew team was never expected to defeat the elite teams of the East Coast and Great Britain, yet they did, going on to shock the world by defeating the German team rowing for Adolf Hitler. Drawing on the boys' own journals and vivid memories of a once-in-a-lifetime shared dream, Brown has created an unforgettable portrait of an era and a celebration of a remarkable achievement."
