A Fair Warning

If you think your Minister should never talk or write about politics, I'm giving you fair warning that politics is my subject. You can quit reading if you'd like, but I hope you won't.

For those still reading, I have found it disconcerting that there are people who don't like to talk about politics in relationship to their faith. Maybe it's because they witness a few Christian preachers/personalities endorse and fawn over their chosen candidate "in the name of Jesus," while others favor the opposition candidate in the same name of apparently the same Jesus, and even others insist the opposing candidate is a henchman or henchwoman of the devil itself. Why get tangled up in that mess?

On the other hand, almost every Christian church insists that the Bible is God's primary source of revelation about who God is, what God prescribes and proscribes, and how much God loves us. Now hear this: The Bible is chock full of people and their governmental rulers! The prophets from Isaiah to Zechariah are about good rule, bad rule, and lack of rule. (Malachi, the last prophet in the list, takes the clergy to task. Uh oh.) Both Ezekiel 34 and Zechariah 11 have colorful allegories of rulers as shepherds, a startling "foretelling" that Jesus Christ himself would

come as Shepherd King and Prince of Peace, leading a kingdom which has no end.

God is <u>eminently</u> concerned about politics, power and peace, and the rulers of the people.

We in these United States will elect a President a month from now. I don't need to repeat what each candidate has said and done, but I hope you don't forget any of it. We are going to live with our choices-not just of President but all others we vote for—and I pray to God, I truly pray to God every day about this, that we as a nation do not return to a bygone era of prejudice and bigotry in an attempt to make America "great" again. Certainly life was somewhat simpler, more clearly defined, and maybe even enjoyable, but only for those of certain ancestry and color. Letting Jim Crow back out of the race bag, and enlarging the theme to include everyone who is "not like me," would create an embarrassing nation of supreme clods. Embarrassing and undoubtedly more dangerous.

On the other hand, so-called "progressive" thought and reason sometimes turns its back on common sense in favor of political ideology and expediency. And there is no excuse for claiming technological ignorance when discussing government-classified information, nor in shouting in exasperation after

intense questioning about loss of life of US ambassadors of peace in death traps, "What difference does it make now?" Such unapologetic hubris makes you wonder what other "best practices" only apply to others.

Recently in a Sunday morning adult conversation prior to worship (each week in the Greeting Room. You are invited!), we discussed how we can talk about politics with open minds and calm demeanors. Here's the challenge I made, extended to you. Read a gospel account before election day. You have a month, and you have four to choose from: Matthew, Mark. Luke, John. Read carefully what Jesus has to say about all sorts of people: rulers, ruled, rich, poor, citizens, foreigners, married, widows, very religious, not so religious, men, women, children, meek, grieving, those in the right, those in the wrong, legalists, libertarians. Throw in some adulterers, lusters, virgins and prostitutes for good measure. Don't forget tax collectors.

Look for relevance to our current political climate and choices. Pretend Jesus lived and taught these things this past year. In a sense he did, because they are timeless.

Allow his words to seep into your soul and help you make best decisions in the voting booth, because Jesus is there, too. Even in the voting booth. Concerning which, if you didn't know before, I have now given you fair warning. Much more important than that, I have given you good advice.

God, help us.


Some of the results of this gathering will be shared at the Family Matters luncheon on November 20.

Music Ministry News from Paul Flyger

This evening as I write, I'm sitting in the O'Hare Oasis (Jim Dansfield's recommendation) waiting for the right time to go to O'Hare's short-term parking to meet my friend, Christian Bischof. He is coming as the International Guest Organist for the University of Michigan's 2016 Organ Conference held this year from October 2-5. Many of you know that I attended his wedding in Munich, Germany in May. You may recall, he was the International Guest Organist for the Regional American Guild of Organists Convention in Kalamazoo in 2013 and he played a concert here at our church on July 7. He will play another local concert this Friday, September 30 at 7:00 p.m. at St. Augustines Catholic Cathedral in Kalamazoo. I hope many of you will try to hear him play as I've never heard another organist with his abilities! It would definitely be worth the drive to Kalamazoo to hear an organist of his caliber.

I'm pleased with the fine group of kids in the Kids Connection Choir on Wednesday evenings. We had a great first rehearsal on Wednesday, September 14 and have been maintaining good attendance since. It's wonderful to see so many families out for Wednesday activities. On the other hand, Joyful Praise Ringers has only two members at the moment due to conflicts with school activities for the other regular members. We've been working on solo ringing techniques and I'm contemplating the purchase of trio music so the three of us can practice our solo ringing technique and perhaps play a trio during worship or the Early Christmas Eve service. We would each be managing 4 or more bells. Solo ringing develops advanced techniques and makes for a really good handbell ringer later in life!

I'm excited to announce that we have a couple new ringers in the Jubilate Ringers Handbell Choir which bring us up to 10 and they are busy working on their next performance as well as new music for the Early Christmas Eve Service. I'm very excited about the potential of this music ensemble. We still have room for one or two more. Special thanks go to Patty Nordberg who is ring in two bell choirs.

The Alleluia Ringers are busy working on new pieces as well as music for the Candlelight Prelude for the Late Christmas Eve Service. Please let me know your preference and desires for the start time of that service. As you have read in Dr. Bob's article, this will be either 8 p.m. or 10:30 p.m. (How many remember the year it was snowing huge flakes when we walked out of Christmas Eve Service at midnight? I found that to be simply magical and I still haven't forgotten it!)

Our next Kids in Worship Sunday will be October 9 which is also Stewardship 1. We will hear from our Kids Connection Choir that day as well. We are also planning another Worship Set of Praise Songs which I have been incorporating into our singing on Wednesday evenings so the kids will be familiar with the songs we sing that day. This was suggested to the Worship Planning Team by one of our devoted parents and we've taken it to heart and will endeavor to do this all year long as another way to make worship more relevant to all - even the youngest worshippers!

Our main event for the month of October will be the Choral Festival at 4 p.m. on Sunday, October 23. Details are being worked out as we are going to press but I can assure you it will be a lovely event with several local choirs joining our Chancel Choir. We have the Sanctuary Choir from the Pioneer Memorial Church choir as well as the Andrews University Singers joining us. A couple more choirs may be joining as well which will bring the total numbers of singers to 100+. Each choir will present on their own and we will open with a grand hymn arrangement and close with a mass choir piece that will utilize the talents of other local musicians.
