


Greetings from Dr. Bob

A Season for Pilgrims

We are in the month of Pilgrims. Every year in my elementary school and Sunday school there was talk of Pilgrims. Maybe even a class skit, which probably was as corny as could be, but which made the "actors" feel very special indeed. I chuckle and shudder to think how we must have portrayed both Pilgrims and Native Americans, but the main point usually came across: Some very brave people risked life and limb to find a better place to live and live out their faith. Only when we grew up did we realize it came with a huge cost to those who already lived there.

If you grew up in a Congregational Church, your youth group might have been called Pilgrim Fellowship and you might have sung out of a Pilgrim Hymnal, as we did here until a few years ago. Congregationalists trace their heritage to those English pilgrims who came here in 1620, reminding us that we, too, are to be champions of Christian freedom in all facets of our lives. It was not an easy journey, and the first years in North America were hard on everybody, even deadly for some. The Native Americans were forced into pilgrimage of their own as a result of innumerable new pilgrims arriving in the new world, "new" being only relevant to the pilgrims, not those already here.



The Bible offers a starting place for us to understand what it is to be a pilgrim, even today. Abraham was called by God to find a land of freedom. His was a difficult journey, and the full promise of living in that land would only be realized by his ancestors, not by Abraham and Sarah. Hebrews 11 is a great chapter on people being faithful to God no matter what. In it we read:

By an act of faith, Abraham said yes to God's call to travel to **an unknown place** that would become his home. When he left **he had no idea where he was going**. By an act of faith he lived in the country promised him, lived as a stranger camping in tents. Isaac and Jacob did the same, living under the same promise. Abraham did it by keeping his eye on an unseen city with real, eternal foundations – the City designed and built by God. Hebrews 11:8-10, The Message

Holiday Blues



Health News from your Parish Nurse Jan

My message this month is to remind those of you who have **not** received your flu shot or shingles vaccination to "Get 'Err Done" for the following reasons:

Flu/Influenza

Each year between 3,000 and 49,000 Americans die from flu and its complications. Although most people are back on their feet within a week after having the flu, certain people are more susceptible to complications. If you have asthma or other lung diseases, or chronic conditions, you are at higher risk of developing complications from flu. Anyone can get the flu as it is spread easily from person to person, usually when an infected person coughs or sneezes. Everyone 6 months of age and older should get a flu vaccination every year.

Shingles


People 60 years of age or older should get a shingles vaccine. They should get the vaccine whether or not they recall having had chickenpox, which is caused by the same virus. Studies show that more than 99% of Americans aged 40 and older have had chickenpox, even if they don't remember getting the disease. There is no maximum age for getting shingles vaccine.

Even if you have had shingles, you can still receive shingles vaccine to help prevent future occurrences of the disease. There is no specific length of time you must wait after having shingles before receiving shingles vaccine, but generally you should make sure the shingles rash has disappeared before getting vaccinated. The decision on when to get vaccinated should be made with your healthcare provider.

Shingles vaccine is approved by the Food and Drug Administration for people aged 50 years and older. However, CDC does not have a recommendation for routine use of shingles vaccine in people 50 through 59 years old. Protection from shingles vaccine lasts about 5 years, so adults vaccinated before they are 60 years old might not be protected later in life when the risk for shingles and its complications are greatest. Adults 50 through 59 years who have questions about shingles vaccine should discuss the risks and benefits with a healthcare provider.

Because of the enormous availability of the flu shot in our community and from the area health care providers, we no longer offer flu shot administration here at First Congregational. Please feel free to contact me however, for information on how to receive these lifesaving immunizations.

Music Ministry News from Paul Flyger



First, a BIG thank you to the Chancel Choir for hosting and singing in the recent Choir Festival Concert that we had in the sanctuary on Sunday afternoon, October 23 at 4 PM. We had over 100 voices from the four local choirs that participated in the Festival Finale, O When the Saints Go Marching In, arranged by John Rutter. Steve Zork invited Journey from Berrien Springs, the Zion United Church of Christ Choir from Baroda, the Andrews University Singers, and of course, our own Chancel Choir. The concert opened with a glorious Sanctus by René Clausen, sung by Andrews University Singers and was followed by an organ solo, When In Our Music God is Glorified (Wilbur Held), by organist Paul Flyger. Each of the guest choirs presented several pieces and all combined at the end for the finale which also included audience participation. Our guest musicians were Mike Perkins, clarinet; Alan Mitchell, trombone; and Robert Johnson, double bass. It was a great afternoon of great music!

November is a time of thankfulness and preparation. The first Sunday is Communion and also our celebration of All Saints Sunday. Even though we do not normally schedule a bell choir on a Communion Sunday, the

Alleluia Ringers will be performing that day in order to present Arnold Sherman's most beautiful arrangement of Londonderry Air on the NEW five octaves of Malmark handchimes that we purchased in July. While I was at the National Seminar for the Handbell Musicians of America, I asked many well-known and prominent handbell conductors what piece they would choose to debut a new 5-octave set of handchimes. Londonderry Air is one of three pieces that will feature the new chimes before Christmas. Kathleen Ebling Shaw, director of the Westminster Concert Bell Choir, suggested we learn Julie Stitt's *La Paix* (Peace). Her choir performed it at their Christmas Concert last year (because their handbells had already been shipped to the West Coast for their bell tour) and it was very well-received by the Westminster Symphony conductor. It is the most difficult piece we have attempted and the Alleluia Ringers are planning to play it at the late Christmas Eve Service during the candle lighting before we all join in singing Silent Night. I hope you will like it also!

The Jubilate Ringers have combined forces with our younger ringers in Joyful Praise this past week. Because of after-school activities and sports, I've only had two young ringers this year. There were also two openings in the Jubilate Ringers so it was suggested to combine and double up parts if necessary. This will make Jubilate Ringers a multi-generational handbell choir and will strengthen the wonderful ringers in this group. We will keep doubling up the parts for anyone still wishing to learn to ring. (This is the best way, because you'll be ringing with someone else on your part!) **The new rehearsal time is Wednesdays from 5:00 - 6:00 PM** giving 30 minutes after rehearsal for dinner in Fellowship Hall before 6:30 activities. Jubilate Ringers are schedule to perform next on Thanksgiving Sunday, Nov 20.



All choirs are beginning to work on their Christmas music for December. The first Sunday of Advent falls on Sunday November 29 and our second annual **Christmas Carols in St. Joseph** will be after the church-wide Christmas Dinner on Wednesday, December 14 (5:30 PM). This year, the Symphony Brass Quintet will be our special guests as we combine brass, organ and bells to accompany the singing of our favorite Christmas Carols in an hour long concert at 7 PM.
