## Case Statement - First Congregational Church

**Our centerpiece: the Sanctuary**  
Our **Sanctuary** was designed and built in the mid 1950's and has served our church congregation very well for nearly 60 years. As we all know, several important projects have been completed during those years to keep it looking beautiful and functional. The most recent examples are the rebuilding of our magnificent pipe organ, the addition of the entrance way ramp, and the cleaning and back-lighting of the rose window, among others. The one thing that has remained unchanged is the layout of the Chancel area with permanent choir pews facing one another on fixed risers, fixed pulpit, lectern, baptismal, and the extremely narrow space between the organ console and the opposite choir pews. The original electrical panels, dimmers, and light fixtures are still being used and in some cases are not working at all anymore. Updates to the electrical system and lighting have been on the Trustees "to do" list for many years.

One of Dr. Braman's last visions for the future was to update the Chancel area to make our sacred worship space more accessible to worshipers, create a more flexible setup for our music and children's programs, and to update the audio, video, and lighting systems for efficiency, visibility, and versatility. The Renovation Committee considers the Sanctuary Renovation Project as most important for the future of the First Congregational Church.

A second priority sits right below the Sanctuary. Women's Fellowship has spearheaded a comprehensive updating of **Fellowship Hall** which, although well maintained, is showing the wear and tear of weekly meetings, dinners, and the bi-annual rummage sales, with dated, inefficient doors, windows, and light fixtures. There is also a moisture problem which is destroying the 60-year old floor tile which contain asbestos and need to be removed professionally.

Third on our renovations list is the **Chapel**. Christian Education is extremely important to our staff, young families, and the future of the church community. Every Sunday the Chapel is used for youth lessons and activities as well as various times during the summer months. The current space with fixed pews, hard surfaces, no air conditioning, and often times insufficient heat in winter, makes this space less than desirable for Christian education. Fixing the HVAC system will also allow for increased use during small weddings or funerals, and church related functions. Several simple and reasonably inexpensive changes are being planned for the Chapel update.

### **Sanctuary updates and improvements include:**

- New LED lighting – significant increase in efficiency, dimmable, programmable, colors
- Enlarged and extended Chancel floor – improved versatility for worship and other performances, handbell setups, piano closer to choir, choir facing congregation, more space for children's programs
- Updated audio and video capabilities for worshipers in the Sanctuary, workers in the Nursery, Greeting Room, Gathering Room, and Fellowship Hall and for live streaming to the web and/or website
- Equipment for projection of hymns, pictures, mission trip presentations, youth group activities, and liturgical readings with no screen
- Replacement of outdated sound board and equipment including mics, speakers
- Electrically operated blinds – to shade the sun on both sides of the Sanctuary
- Moveable pulpit, lectern and baptismal font – increased Chancel flexibility
- Handicap Accessibility in the Chancel area – allowing everyone to be involved in worship leadership

### **Fellowship Hall:**

- New LED light fixtures – energy efficient with wider dispersion and modern look
- New windows, shades and patio doors – energy efficient and updated look
- Updated sound system
- Removal of asbestos tile, water-proofing, updated flooring
- Paint and plaster work – updated look at minimal expense

### **Chapel:**

- HVAC improvements – add air conditioning and independent heat operation (currently the Chapel operates whenever the Sanctuary is set to run - very inefficient) – increased use capabilities for Christian Education, small weddings or funerals, and other church related uses
- Replace pews with moveable and stackable chairs – flexibility for Christian Education use
- Carpet the main floor – inviting look and feel for young people

### **The outcomes of these projects:**

- Significantly improved areas that will provide staff, worshipers, and performers with outstanding experiences while also accommodating a broad range of activities including worship services, Christian Education programs, weddings, concerts and special performances
- A “greener” more energy and fiscally efficient operation
- Improved work spaces which enable ministers, musicians, directors, and staff to be more creative and productive, while maximizing resources and producing the highest quality worship experiences

### **How will the project be funded?**

The complete Sanctuary renovation is estimated to be \$325,000. Fellowship Hall is estimated to be approximately \$150,000 or less depending on the removal of the asbestos tiles. The initial Chapel update is estimated at approximately \$25,000. Pearson Construction has given our Renovation Committee these ball park estimates but final costs are always determined by choices in flooring, furniture replacement, and unknown cost overruns. The good news is we are already half way there through available Building and Site Funds, Endowment Funds, and recent gifts to the church. Women's Fellowship has committed \$60,000 over the next three years towards Fellowship Hall. In addition, our electric company AEP is offering commercial projects such as ours, a substantial rebate program for updating electric systems to LED, and HVAC improvements up to \$50,000.

Our Capital Campaign goal for this major project is \$225,000. The Trustees have approved a Capital Campaign pledge drive over three years that will complete the fund drive necessary for all three phases of the project. Pledge cards will be available to everyone in early February and as always, gifts to the church are tax deductible.

### **Focus Group Sessions:**

Six question and answer Renovation Focus Group Sessions are being planned for February and early March at various times and days of the week. If warranted we will also plan one in mid April for 'snow birds' that would like to attend. Anyone that would like more information or has questions about these projects is encouraged to attend any or all of these sessions. We'll start each session with a power-point presentation showing the planned improvements, followed by a chance for discussion and questions. Staff and committee members will be in attendance to help with each of these group sessions. Feel free to discuss these plans with any committee member individually as well.

### **Summing it up:**

Our Visions Statement reads "As believers in Jesus Christ, we will be a church of vibrant Christians". We need to stay "vibrant" to attract new families, maintain our excellent service to the community, and fulfill our commitment to our present church membership. It is our belief that updating the Sanctuary for worship services, Fellowship Hall for the many activities it is used for, and the Chapel for Christian Education and other church related activities, will not only take care of long-term maintenance issues but will provide updated, state of the art capabilities for future generations of First Congregational Church members.

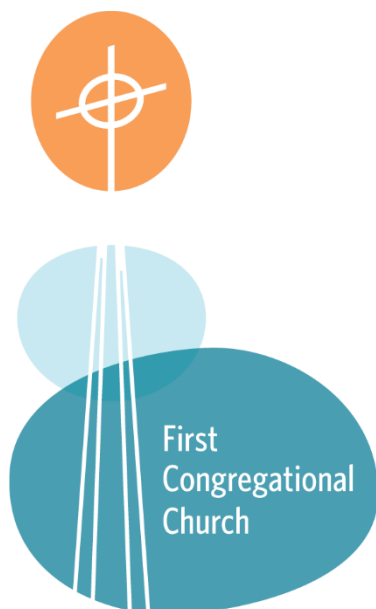
