Christian Symbols

On Ash Wednesday, as Lent begins, worshipers' foreheads are often marked with ashes in the sign of the cross. The ashes traditionally come from burning palm branches from the previous Palm Sunday. In Old Testament days, ashes were a sign of mourning and repentance. Today, some worshipers wipe off the ashes before leaving church, to symbolize being cleansed from sin by Jesus' death; others wear the ashes the rest of the day, carrying the cross of Christ into the world. The speaking of Genesis 3:19 often accompanies the placement of ashes: "You are dust, and to dust you shall return."

March is Colon Cancer Awareness Month The Facts:

Colon Cancer is the second leading cause of cancer-related deaths in the United States among men and women combined, and affects people of all racial and ethnic groups.

- 1. It touches more than 132,000* Americans annually and claims nearly 50,000 lives.
- 2. Overall, the lifetime risk of developing colon cancer is about 1 in 20.
- 3. It is most often found in people 50 years or older, but can occur at any age.
- 4. It is one of the most **detectable** and **treatable** forms of cancer, and more than **90 percent** of all cases can be prevented with recommended screening.

Everyone 50 years and older, and those with symptoms or a family history, should be screened regularly for colon cancer.

Thanks to increased and improved patient screening, and improved treatment options, the mortality rate from the disease has dropped over the past 20 years. There are currently more than one million colon cancer survivors in the United States. Sanctuary, Fellowship Hall and Chapel Renovation Project FCC Focus Groups 1-3 Frequently Asked Questions

Q. I am a traditionalist and feel that the location of the altar, cross, flowers, and candles should be in the center. Placing the choir behind the altar is distracting. We want to preserve this as a "holy and sacred" place and personal time in worship.

A. This sentiment is shared by many. A good option would be to split the new moveable choir risers into two sections and place them on either side of the altar. This would allow us to move the altar back where it originally was directly against the front wall with everything placed on it as usual. There will be room for the choir risers to be placed flat against the wall on either side OR angled slightly towards the center. Either way the main focus would be on the altar, cross, candles, etc., without anyone sitting or standing behind the altar. What is important for our music staff is that the moveable choir risers could be placed in various positions depending on the needs for concert groups, special performances, guest choirs, etc.

Q. Since the chairs and risers are moveable, is there storage space when not used?

A.We are looking at equipment that can easily be moved and stored. The current choir risers can fold down to 4" with the legs removed for storage. Chairs on carts can fit under the stairs by the balcony. We are also removing the storage racks from under the organ chamber on the right side of the Chancel to provide temporary storage for chairs and risers if needed.

Q. People are impressed with the time and care given to the Rose Window. How often will there be projections below it which might interfere with the view?

A.Not often...mainly to share photos from the Russian Connection, youth mission trips and other similar situations. It could also be used to project words to hymns that are not in the hymnal and announcements before church. The Rose Window view would never be compromised when the projector is used which would be rarely.

Q. Is it possible to put monitors in the hallway? Our present bulletin boards limit the number of photos and announcements that can be displayed?

A. Our current computer company has given us a bid to wire the church allowing for monitors at the entrances, the Gathering and Greeting Rooms, Nursery and Chapel with announcements running on a regular basis. This would allow all those visiting the church to see what is going on.

Q. Will the boiler be an issue?

A. Only updates to the HVAC in the Chapel are needed. Current boiler is OK.

Q. In Fellowship Hour people tend to sit/talk with their friends and may not make younger or newer members welcome.

A. Members do need to be more open with young families. Church members are encouraged to wear name tags and converse with adults and children. Enhancing the website (making it current) and letting people know about church activities would also be a benefit to those wanting to learn about FCC.

Q. Are there going to be hand rails provided for the Chancel steps?

A. There will be hand rails by the side steps and choir risers. We're also looking into providing detachable hand rails in the center for choir members to use.

Q. Where will the hymnals & Bibles be for the chairs if the first two pews are gone?

A. The chairs will have racks behind the chairs or a shelf underneath.

Q. What is the seating capacity for the church now and will that change if there are chairs instead of pews up front?

A. No change - the chairs are replacing the seating area for the first two pews. However, two short pews would need to be removed for the new sound and video board in the back of the Sanctuary.

Q. How many people will be needed each Sunday for sound and video?

A. Two just like we use now. They will be sitting next to each other with all the new system controls on the main floor in the back.

Q. Will there be more wireless mics for the Youth Program at Christmas, etc.?

A. We will keep the wireless mics we have and add 2-3 more with the renovation, so yes, we will have more wireless mics available to use when needed.

Q. Will the windows and/or doors in Fellowship Hall be regular glass or have you thought about using glass blocks?

A. Glass blocks should be researched and this is a good suggestion. We will be looking at the most energy efficient system that still provides light.

Q. How will you know how severe the moisture problem is under the tile in Fellowship Hall?

A. After the present tile is removed the cement slab will be tested to see how much moisture treatment is needed prior to the installation of any flooring materials.

Q. Will the storage area in the corner of Fellowship Hall that is used for rummage items, chairs, etc., also be tested? Would it need to be sealed?

A. There is a sump pump there, and yes, we will look into sealing that area as well.

Q. Rather than disturb the Chapel, could the children/youth use the Sunday School rooms or Fellowship Hall on Sunday mornings?

A. Right now the Chapel is used by Christian Education every Sunday morning as a gathering place for all students. C.E. feels it's important to start together and at the same time provide the feel of a small Sanctuary, then go to the Sunday School rooms by age level. Fellowship Hall is often set up for other uses and does not convert easily. Right now Fellowship Hall is the most used space in the church.

Q. What will we do with the pews from the sanctuary and chapel?

A. They could be sold or donated. Options include the UCC newsletter or BCC of Churches. If any church members would like one please let us know!

Q. Will the new sound system accommodate the T-Loop system for hearing aides?

A. The T-Loop system currently in the sanctuary will still be functional and well as in Fellowship Hall.

Q. Children are missed during church. They are only there once a month. Would it be possible to have the children stay for a children's message every week and if they need more Sunday School time could the parents attend Fellowship Hour for a little while and have Sunday School go longer?

A. The present system will be evaluated in May. Allowing the children more time in Sunday School each Sunday was suggested by several of the families with young children. Young families are encouraged to attend any of the remaining focus group sessions. We need your input!

Q. What is the overall budget for the Renovations?

A. The Renovation estimates have been sent to all church members in a pledge letter along with a pledge card. The February Parchment also has a detailed list of that information. Over half of the money has been raised through a variety of ways within the church with \$225,000 to go. And the Renovation and Capital Campaign Committee members have already pledged giving us a \$50,000 head start.

Q. What if enough money is not raised? Can the work be done in phases?

A.If funds are not available up front there are things that can be put off until later. Examples would be waiting on the Sanctuary blinds, the new doors and windows in Fellowship Hall, or the Chapel Renovation.

Q. Can church members donate funds toward a specific update such as the Sanctuary lift, the Sanctuary window blinds, or the Chapel renovation for Christian Ed?

A. YES - the Capital Campaign Team is more than happy to entertain gifts towards a certain improvement. Just let us know what you'd like to specifically support and we can make that happen.

Q. Our budget is not as high as other years. We've heard that Stewardship pledging is not as strong as it has been.

A.While yearly pledging is lower, plate giving has increased. Many people choose to give differently than in the past. This makes it difficult to project for budgeting purposes but if church attendance can be maintained or strengthened then the opportunity for 'plate' giving increases. This is one of the reasons for sprucing up our Sanctuary - to increase flexibility in our worship service and music programs that in turn can encourage growth in our membership and particularly for young families.

Q. Can pledges be paid with automatic withdraw?

A. Yes. Call the church office and they'll be happy to send you a form to fill out.

Q. What is the Renovation timeline?

A.The Fellowship Hall renovation will be first and is scheduled to begin after the May 5 rummage sale to be completed by September 1 (after the summer weddings). Worship would then move to the updated Fellowship Hall while the Sanctuary work begins in September. The Sanctuary should take 8-10 weeks and be complete by the middle of November. The Chapel work will begin as funds are available.

Thank you to the 50 plus church members who have attended the first three Focus Group Sessions where these questions were raised. The FCC Renovation Committee will do another "Questions and Answers" Parchment article after the remaining three Focus Group Sessions. In the meantime, if anyone has any additional suggestions or questions please feel free to contact any committee member for information.

During March students will complete one series called *DEAL WITH IT*. So what's trending on Netflix this week? Maybe TV isn't your thing, but I'll bet you've got a time vortex. Maybe yours is a gaming system. You log on for just a few minutes and then, somehow it's midnight. Maybe you throw on headphones and just space out listening to Spotify, or maybe you stare at your phone and scroll without even really looking at what people post. We all have a favorite distraction-something we get lost in. And while there's nothing wrong with taking a break, you've probably

also discovered that it's more tempting to reach for something fun when you're facing something that isn't. We all have a tendency to avoid something difficult by doing something easy. Or we escape something painful by running toward something that feels good. Or we hide something that hurts by pretending it isn't there. But maybe you've also noticed that none of these strategies really work. In fact, sometimes our favorite escapes can leave us feeling more stuck than before. In this series we'll look at three ways we're all tempted to skip out on the real life that God has for us. As we do, you may just find God's inviting you to stop avoiding it, escaping it, or hiding it and just...deal with it.

The lessons we want students to learn each week during the *Deal With It* series include:

When you face a challenge, attacking is better than avoiding. God carries us through problems, not around them. Comfort comes from community.

During March students will complete a second series call CREW.

Who are the people you enjoy hanging out with most? Your friends, right? They laugh at your jokes, reply to your Snapchats, invite you to the movies, and hang out with you, even when you smell bad or show off your terrible dance moves. And whether you have a huge group of friends or just one BFF, they can have a huge impact on who you are now *and* who you become later. But have you ever thought about how you got those friends in the first place? Maybe their family just happened to move in down the street from yours or you ended up in the same ballet class. Maybe you randomly sat next to each other in Chemistry or you just happened to play the same sport. While none of those are bad ways to make friends, it's strange that we leave such an important part of our lives to chance. Perhaps that's why the Bible has so much to say about how we choose and treat our friends. As we look to the Bible for advice about our friendships, we'll discover that one of the best things we can do for our crew is to be their friend on purpose.

The lessons we want student to learn each week during the *Crew* series include:

Your friends can make you or break you. Pay attention to who you're listening to.

When it comes to conflict with your crew, relationships are greater than revenge.


