Greetings:

I want to thank everyone for their patience, understanding, and kindness during this difficult time. It's been incredible to see the community stand "together" in this season, despite limitations. Church Council has further deliberated concerning COVID-19 amid national and local updates, trying to determine the best course of action going forward. At this time, we believe it to be for the benefit of everyone's health to <u>extend the cancellation of church services and events through the month of April until May 1</u>.

This was an incredibly difficult decision to make, especially seeing as such action would place Holy Week services to a <u>virtual-only option</u>. However, Council is listening to the voices of health professionals and fellow faith communities in seeking to protect at-risk populations and further combat exposure to COVID-19. As we have already experienced, the Church is "more" than any building or activity – *it is the people*. And for the sake of people, God's Image-bearers, we want to do all we can to protect and save lives.

Worship will continue through the livestream on Sunday mornings at 10:30. A direct link to the video will be sent out via email and text each week as well as posted on Facebook: <u>https://www.facebook.com/FCCStJoseph/</u>. You may also view the service as usual on the church website. If you don't watch live, you can always watch it later at any time!

I will continue sending out a devotional series to provide reflection for "at home" discipleship. Some Holy Week alternatives are being prepared that follow the rules of social distancing while allowing "at-home" participation in our most sacred season [stay tuned]. If you need anything, please ask! You can reach me at the church office M-Th (9-5) or by cell/email. All the church staff are praying and working, albeit in new and different ways, to make sure FCC is ministry-capable, whenever we return to normalcy.
